

TETHERING PROTOCOL

Corresponds with Requirement 6.2

Tethering is a form of restraint and refers to attaching a long rope or chain to the halter or leg hobble on a horse. Tethering does not refer to tie-stalls or temporarily tying a horse to a fixed object (e.g., for grooming or tacking up). Tethering can pose a high risk of injury to horses unless performed correctly. Tethering is only used to restrain horses off-site temporarily (e.g., during backpacking or trail riding).
